## Medium

## Description

The ensemble is named after the black-embroidered chemise, or koshula cretica, which was adapted from the chemise worn in neighboring Skopska Crna Gora. The other el-ements, such as the sleeveless wool coat decorated with pompoms, the apron, and head scarf, are typically Skopska Blatiya style. The bridal coat or kyurdiya has more rows of red pompoms than would the kyurdiya worn by a recently married or older woman. A bride would deliberately wear the apron pooched out so that she

appeared to be pregnant (Young Brides, Old Treasures: Macedonian Embroidered Dress, edited by Bobbie Sumberg, 2011).
